## **2015 Restoration Projects Accomplishments**


The addition of a Habitat Restoration Intern in 2015 allowed for more focus on volunteer opportunities and restoration projects.

- 656 volunteers
- 1885 volunteer hours
- 453 plants planted
- Hundreds of invasive plant species were removed from riparian areas
- Six truck-loads of beaver exclusion fencing were removed from established trees. Non-toxic sand paint was added to tree trunks for continued protection from beavers.

### **Water Quality Monitoring**

Continued to collect water quality and macroinvertebrate data at various long-term monitoring sites throughout the Eagle River Watershed. Additional partnerships allowed

for expansion with 12 new sites on tributaries of the Gore Creek Watershed.

#### **Education**

Over **600 youth** were reached through our engaging school curriculum.



Students collected, identified and counted river macroinvertebrates (insects) & learned about the correlation between bugs and river health

And over **440 adults** were reached through free Watershed Wednesday tours and presentations.



### **Native Species Conservation**

2015 marked the inaugural year of our program with the White River National Forest to train citizen scientists to identify locations of native fish populations by sampling eDNA (environmental DNA) in small streams throughout the watershed. 12 streams were sampled – 8 were found to have genetically-pure cutthroats. Habitat protection projects are being planned now using this data.
